Since their first flight in July 2007, the team of doctors, dispatchers, paramedics and pilots have responded to more than 20,000 emergencies across Hampshire and the Isle of Wight from their Airbase in Thruxton, Andover.

SPEAKER'S CORNER - review of June's talk:

Songs of War from Tudor times to World War 2 performed by John Connell

Usually performing as a duo with John Miller, the performance was carried by John Connell with only 24 hours' notice of John M's indisposition.

Starting with a Tudor drinking song praising Queen Elizabeth 1st, the audience was taken through the ages illustrated by songs and video clips. Poignant reminders of World War I in the song "Scarlet & the Blue" when young men were recruited from the same towns and villages to form the PALS regiments and often died together. The song "Long Trail a-Winding" was illustrated by video clips of women at their war work. In World War II the troops who were victorious in North Africa crossed the Mediterranean to fight their way through Italy. After D-Day, Lady Astor, the first female MP, called the troops in Italy "D-Day dodgers" A song was written and performed on video for us to dispel her deeply mistaken perception! I was moved to tears by the final video performance by the late Jim Radford. He went to sea at 14 as a galley boy and was on a tug towing one of the Mulberry harbours to Normandy. His rendition of "The Shores of Normandy" was a fitting ending to the afternoon. The final two verses recalling the horrors of war:

"For every hero's name that's known
A thousand died as well
On stakes and wires their bodies hung
Rocked in the ocean swell
And many a mother wept that day
For the sons they loved so well
Men who cracked a joke and cadged a smoke
As they stormed the gates of hell

As the years pass by
I can still recall the men I saw that day
Who died upon that blood-soaked sand
Where now sweet children play
And those of you who were unborn
Who've lived in liberty
Remember those who made it so
On the shores of Normandy"

LOCAL GOVERNMENT REORGANISATION – HAVE YOUR SAY

Currently, the area of Hampshire, Portsmouth, Southampton and the Isle of Wight is made up of Hampshire County Council with 12 district / borough councils, and three separate unitary authority councils - Southampton, Portsmouth and the Isle of Wight.

The UK Government has asked councils across England to look at how they are organised, with the aim of improving services and making better use of public money and to put forward proposals for new unitary authority councils.




The proposals aim to ensure that these new councils provide the best balance of local decision-making and sustainable size and are large enough to deliver high quality services and value for money, but small enough to be connected to the place and people they serve. To achieve this, the proposals outline options for four unitary councils on the mainland. This would mean one council delivers the

majority of local services. Although Portsmouth, Southampton and Isle of Wight already have a single council they are included in the proposed changes and may end up joining with other council areas in Hampshire.

These four unitary councils would surround four key hubs for the area where people tend to look for services, jobs, education, leisure and transport - Portsmouth, Southampton, Winchester and Basingstoke. The proposals would also ensure that Isle of Wight continues as its own unitary council.

Residents are being asked for their views on how their council should change as part of the government's plans to reform local government.

There are three options under consideration with the broad areas of Fareham, Gosport, Havant and Portsmouth forming one of the proposed new unitary councils. However, one of the proposals suggests that some parishes currently in these local councils are covered by a different unitary authority – these parishes are Denmead, Newlands, Horndean, Clanfield, Rowlands Castle, Boarhunt, Southwick, Widley, Wickham, Knowle and Whiteley.

DO YOU VOTE BY POST? YOU MAY NEED TO RE-APPLY



Following changes to the Elections Act, a voter can hold a postal vote for a maximum period of three years. All electors who had a postal vote in place prior to 31st October 2023 will need to re-apply before the deadline of 31 January 2026.

This applies to UK Parliamentary elections (not Northern Ireland), including by-elections and recall petitions; local elections in England and Policy & Crime Commissioner elections in England and Wales.

Postal voters who have provided their email address to their electoral registration office will be sent an email with details of how to renew their postal vote application. For those electors without email, they will be contacted by post in September.

JULY DATES & TRIVIA

- 1st (2007) smoking in public places was banned in England.
- 6th (1895) Micheldever saw the first car ride in Britain; the Hon. Evelyn Ellis and Frederick Simms drove an imported French Panhard-Levassor from Micheldever to Datchet. Ellis was a speed fiend and reached a daring 20 mph vastly exceeding the then maximum speed limit of 4 mph.



8th



(1937) the first 999 call was made by a Mrs. Beard of Hampstead who reported a burglary in the early hours of the morning, while her husband was trying to apprehend the perpetrator; as a result of police action Thomas Duffy – a 24-year old criminal – was apprehended.

9th (1981) Donkey Kong was released by Nintendo.
 (1877) the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club in London hosted the first Wimbledon championship.

10th

(1958) the first parking meter was installed outside the US Embassy in Grosvenor Square, Mayfair. The cost was 6d per hour, with a fixed penalty fine of £2 for those unwilling to pay.

11th **Full moon** – traditionally known as the Buck Moon – named for the time when male deer begin to grow their new antlers. It is also known as the Thunder Moon and the Hay Moon.

14th (1867) Alfred Nobel demonstrated dynamite for the first time in the UK at Merstham Quarry in Surrey.

(1928) the first National Grid electricity pylon was erected at Bonnyfield, near Falkirk. The word *pylon* derives from a Greek word for an Egyptian temple entrance.

- 18th -10th August **Big Butterfly Count**. Where are all the butterflies? This is a UK-wide survey that everyone can take part in. Follow this link for further information and full instructions on how to take part. https://bigbutterflycount.butterfly-conservation.org/ You can do it online of via an app if you have a smartphone.
- 19th (1545) Battle of the Solent between the English and French, during which Henry VIII's flagship *Mary Rose* was sunk.
- 21st (1884) the first Test Match at Lord's England beat Australia.
- 24th (1936) the Speaking Clock was introduced using the voice of telephonist Ethel Jane Cane. She won a competition involving 15,000 telephonists, her prize being ten guineas (roughly £950 today). The 1936 glass discs, relays, valves, etc. filled an entire room; today the digital equipment occupies the space of a suitcase.
 - (2025) Pythagorean Theorem Day. Mini maths refresher Pythagoras' Theorem defines the relationship between the sides of a triangle where the square of the hypotenuse (longest side of the triangle) is equal to the sum of the square of the other two sides. Well, today's date fits that formula $24/7/25 : 24^2 + 7^2 = 24^2$.
- 25th (1978) birth of Louise Joy Brown the world's first "test tube" baby.
- 26th (1803) the first public railway opened the Surrey Iron Railway ran the nine miles from Wandsworth via Mitcham to Croydon.
- 28th (1959) saw the introduction of postcodes first trialled in Norwich and extended to cover the entire country by 1974.
- 31st (1970) the last day of the Rum Ration (also known as Nelson's Blood)
 a tradition dating back to 1655. At 11 am the pipe-signal *Up Spirits*was sounded for the last time, commemorated in the Navy's home of
 Portsmouth by the issuing of a special stamp and on board ship by the wearing of black armbands.

Bird of the month – Blackbird

Is there a more melodious sound in the garden than the song of the blackbird? They are great companions to have hopping about with you while you potter in the garden. They are particularly fond of earthworms and will listen for their movement underground. The breeding season for this familiar garden bird ends this month, with blackbirds having two or three broods. You can see blackbirds in the garden all year round = particularly if you have a lot of autumn-berried shrubs or leave a few wind fallen apples on the ground.

The oldest blackbird on record was 21 years and one month old, way above the average life expectancy of around three years.





July fruit: apples, apricots, bilberries, blackcurrants, blueberries, cherries, gooseberries, greengages, kiwi fruit, loganberries, melons, peaches, plums, raspberries, redcurrants, rhubarb, strawberries.

July vegetables artichoke, aubergine, beetroot, broad beans, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, chicory, chillies, courgettes, cucumber, fennel, French beans, garlic, kohlrabi, lettuce, mange tout, new potatoes, onions, pak choi, peas, radishes, rocket, runner beans, samphire, sorrel, spinach, spring greens, spring onions, summer squash, Swiss chard, tomatoes, turnips, watercress.
